Today's Worship

Not a single person has gone unaffected by it. All of us have had loved ones die, and we know that our lives on this earth will someday come to an end as well. And because death is an ugly, unnatural thing, people fear it. We're constantly trying to eat healthy, or exercise, or have medical procedures done, in order to stave off death. But we know it's inevitable. Someday, we will all die. And yet, for the Christian, death doesn't have to be something we fear. Because we know what comes next! On our Lenten walk to Calvary, the Church sees the Savior come face to face with death and defeat it completely. As he raises Lazarus from the dead, and as he promises that he is the Resurrection and the Life, who will give resurrection and life to all who believe!

Weekly Memory Passage: ¹³ Then you, my people, will know that I am the LORD, when I open your graves and bring you up from them. ¹⁴ I will put my Spirit in you and you will live, and I will settle you in your own land. Then you will know that I the LORD have spoken, and I have done it, declares the LORD.'"

(Ezekiel 37:13-14)

The Season of Lent

The word Lent comes from an Old English word for Spring (*lengten*), the time of the year when the days grow longer. For the last 1,700 years, the Church has set aside the 40 days between Ash Wednesday and Easter as a time of special preparation. It is a time of repentance and renewal. During Lent, our rejoicing is muted as we remember our Lord's suffering and death. But it is with a purpose: we know that the Lord who died took up his life again on Easter Sunday morning. So our 40 days of Lent are ones lived in the certain hope of the resurrection.

THE WORD

FIRST LESSON: Ezekiel 37:1-14

The Valley of Dry Bones

The hand of the Lord was on me, and he brought me out by the Spirit of the Lord and set me in the middle of a valley; it was full of bones. ²He led me back and forth among them, and I saw a great

many bones on the floor of the valley, bones that were very dry. ³He asked me, "Son of man, can

these bones live?"

I said, "Sovereign Lord, you alone know."

⁴Then he said to me, "Prophesy to these bones and say to them, 'Dry bones, hear the word of

the Lord! 5 This is what the Sovereign Lord says to these bones: I will make breath enter you, and you will come to life. ⁶I will attach tendons to you and make flesh come upon you and cover you

with skin; I will put breath in you, and you will come to life. Then you will know that I am

the Lord.'"

⁷So I prophesied as I was commanded. And as I was prophesying, there was a noise, a rattling

sound, and the bones came together, bone to bone. 8I looked, and tendons and flesh appeared on

them and skin covered them, but there was no breath in them.

⁹Then he said to me, "Prophesy to the breath; prophesy, son of man, and say to it, 'This is what the

Sovereign Lord says: Come, breath, from the four winds and breathe into these slain, that they may

live." 10 So I prophesied as he commanded me, and breath entered them; they came to life and stood

up on their feet—a vast army.

¹¹ Then he said to me: "Son of man, these bones are the people of Israel. They say, 'Our bones are

dried up and our hope is gone; we are cut off.' 12 Therefore prophesy and say to them: 'This is what

the Sovereign Lord says: My people, I am going to open your graves and bring you up from them; I

will bring you back to the land of Israel. 13 Then you, my people, will know that I am the LORD, when

I open your graves and bring you up from them. ¹⁴I will put my Spirit in you and you will live, and

I will settle you in your own land. Then you will know that I the Lord have spoken, and I have done

it, declares the Lord."

M: This is the Word of the Lord.

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SECOND LESSON: Romans 8:11-19

Death in the flesh, Life in the Spirit

¹¹ And if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will also give life to your mortal bodies because of his Spirit who lives in you. ¹² Therefore, brothers and sisters, we have an obligation—but it is not to the flesh, to live according to it. ¹³ For if you live according to the flesh, you will die; but if by the Spirit you put to death the misdeeds of the body, you will live. ¹⁴ For those who are led by the Spirit of God are the children of God. ¹⁵ The Spirit you received does not make you slaves, so that you live in fear again; rather, the Spirit you received brought about your adoption to sonship. And by him we cry, "Abba, Father." ¹⁶ The Spirit himself testifies with our spirit that we are God's children. ¹⁷ Now if we are children, then we are heirs—heirs of God and co-heirs with Christ, if indeed we share in his sufferings in order that we may also share in his glory. ¹⁸ I consider that our present sufferings are not worth comparing with the glory that will be revealed in us. ¹⁹ For the creation waits in eager expectation for the children of God to be revealed.

M: This is the Word of the Lord.

C: Thanks be to God.

GOSPEL: John 11:17-27, 38-45

Jesus raises Lazarus from the dead

¹⁷On his arrival, Jesus found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb for four days. ¹⁸Now Bethany was less than two miles from Jerusalem, ¹⁹ and many Jews had come to Martha and Mary to comfort them in the loss of their brother. ²⁰When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went out to meet him, but Mary stayed at home.

²¹ "Lord," Martha said to Jesus, "if you had been here, my brother would not have died. ²² But I know that even now God will give you whatever you ask."

²³Jesus said to her, "Your brother will rise again."

²⁴ Martha answered, "I know he will rise again in the resurrection at the last day."

²⁵ Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me will live, even though they die; ²⁶ and whoever lives by believing in me will never die. Do you believe this?"

²⁷ "Yes, Lord," she replied, "I believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, who is to come into the world."

³⁸ Jesus, once more deeply moved, came to the tomb. It was a cave with a stone laid across the entrance. ³⁹ "Take away the stone," he said.

"But, Lord," said Martha, the sister of the dead man, "by this time there is a bad odor, for he has been there four days."

⁴⁰ Then Jesus said, "Did I not tell you that if you believe, you will see the glory of God?"

⁴¹ So they took away the stone. Then Jesus looked up and said, "Father, I thank you that you have heard me. ⁴² I knew that you always hear me, but I said this for the benefit of the people standing here, that they may believe that you sent me."

⁴³ When he had said this, Jesus called in a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" ⁴⁴ The dead man came out, his hands and feet wrapped with strips of linen, and a cloth around his face.

Jesus said to them, "Take off the grave clothes and let him go." ⁴⁵ Therefore many of the Jews who had come to visit Mary, and had seen what Jesus did, believed in him.

M: This is the Gospel of the Lord.

CONFESSION OF FAITH FOR LENT

This is what the Bible teaches and, therefore, what we believe. We believe in Jesus Christ; He is the true God from all eternity almighty, all-knowing, present in all places.
